MURDERER DALE IS CAPTURED

He Escaped from Mountain Cabin and Was Arrested While Boarding Train—Third Victim May Die.

Greenwood, B. C., Oct. 17. (Special.)—James Dale, the Carni boarding-housekeeper who shot and killed two men, and wounded a third, was captured at noon to-day when boarding the Great Northern train for Spokane. During the night Dale got away from the mountain cabin where he committed the murders and started for Greenwood. He first headed for Midway, but came here in the dark of the early morning. He carried a heavy revolver. He was taken by James A. Blashmore, constable at Grand Forks. Great excitement prevailed over the case last evening. It was believed he would make a stand and there would be more bloodshed in his capture. Provincial police officers were being gathered from all parts of the country to join in the attempt to capture him. The murderer's wife is prostrated with grief. David Smith, the man who was injured, is likely to die from the effects of Dale's bullets. The bodies of Joe Bell and P. Bourderez have been brought in, and an inquest will be held this afternoon. Dale claims that he was drunk when he did the shooting.

NEW SWIMMING POOL FOR Y. M. C. A. BUILDING

A diversity of interests were represented by the permits given by Building Inspector McSpadden this morning. On the one hand, Mr. A. E. Carter, contractor, received permission to construct an addition to the Y. M. C. A. building, which will give the membership the advantages it has long desired in the line of a swimming pool. The tank to be constructed will be of canvas finish, nineteen feet wide and forty-two feet long. The bottom will be sloping, giving depths varying from three feet to six feet six inches. A gallery will be constructed around the pool, and at the end a springboard will be placed. In connection with this change alterations will be made in the gymnasium, increasing its efficiency, and also providing a dark room for the benefit of the members of the photographic art. The cost of the work is given at \$3500. On the other hand, permits were granted for the construction of three houses on Harris street, in the section which has been noted several times in these columns as the "restricted district" of the city. The houses now planned about fill up the available space in block 18, and are to be comparatively costly structures two being listed at \$7000 each, and the other at \$6500. Other permits were issued to A. Nelson, Richards street, \$400; and Win. Acorn, Sixth avenue, \$1500.

...the Japanese and Indians are expressly excluded, but the special designation of the nationality in the case of these Asiatic races would prevent the Hindu being included with them. It would seem that there being no negative legislation, the ordinary rules governing British subjects must prevail, which entitles the men to the franchise privilege after a proper term of residence.

Polls Are Unprotected.

Another opinion pointed out the possibility of excluding the Hindus under the term "Indian" by including in its meaning East Indians as well as North American Indians. It was admitted, however, that this would be a forced interpretation of the term, and one not in the minds of the legislators enacting the provisions.

A cursory glance at the problem presented would, therefore, seem to indicate that the polls are unprotected at the point noted by reason of the failure of the enacting bodies to grasp in advance the conditions under which the province is laboring to-day.

Jobs for Twenty-five.

The Hindus who arrived in Vancouver on Monday from Hongkong will shortly be distributed throughout the interior of the province. An application for the delivery of twenty-five of them has been received from an up-country employer of labor, and an order for another fifty is in sight. Within the next few days it is expected that arrangements will have been completed for the shipping of the entire lot to interior points.

It is pointed out that it is no concern of the city of Vancouver if these men are dispatched to interior points. Therefore there is no likelihood of police interference when they are released from the Dominion detention shed on the C. P. R. wharf and entrained for their destination. As long as the Hindus are not allowed to spread through the city the civic authorities may be satisfied.

Coming Back from Cariboo.

On the other hand, once the Hindus are safely in the country there will be nothing to prevent them returning to Vancouver and taking up their residence here any time they feel so inclined. While the city police can easily guard the undesirables by surrounding the detention shed, it will be impossible for them to prevent the Hindus sneaking in by the rear entrance should they tire of their work in the interior.

This is a problem within the greater problem of Hindu immigration which the civic officials will likely be forced to meet within the next few months. At the present time about a hundred Hindus are reported on the way to Vancouver from Ashcroft. They are returning to the mild climate of the coast from Cariboo, where the cold is too intense for them to stand.

HOLIDAY CROWD LEAVES FOR CAPITAL TO-DAY

IN CHICAGO

Negroes Are Responsible for Two Capital Offences— Dreadful Record of Violence and Lawlessness.

Chicago, Oct. 17.—Two murders, a suicide, two men dying from knife wounds, an attempted lynching, and two men in jail on capital charges, constituted Chicago's record of violence to-day. Here is the list of crimes:

Miss Mamie Nichols, shot dead by George Williams, a negro, who killed himself before he could be arrested. William Cheney, foreman of work on drainage canal, shot dead by Antonio Astorita, a discharged workman. The murderer is in jail, but on the way there an attempt was made to lynch him.

Assistant General Passenger Agent Louis Diebel, of the Northwestern Railroad, fatally stabbed by unknown negro, whom he had asked to show his ticket.

John Herbert, fatally stabbed by unknown highwayman.

Of the two murders, that of Miss Nichols is the most mysterious. The young woman, who is of excellent character, had entered a drugstore, and stepped into the telephone booth, when Williams appeared in the doorway, hastily crossed the store, jerked open the door of the booth, and shot Miss Nichols through the head. The drug-gist rushed from behind the prescription case just in time to see the murderer level his revolver at his own temple, pull the trigger, and fall dead.

WAS FINED FOR FOULING RIVER

Japanese Is Taxed Forty Dollars and Costs in New Westminster District Court.

New Westminster, Oct. 17. (Special.)—Forty dollars fine and a half dollar costs was the penalty imposed on the Japanese who have been running the British Columbia cannery for throwing offal into the river, in the New Westminster District Court this morning.

Information was conveyed some time ago to Mr. Frank DeGrey, his local agent of the provincial Health Department, to the effect that the Japanese who have engaged the cannery for the purpose of putting up dog salmon were fouling the river with the offal instead of collecting it, as prescribed by law. Mr. DeGrey warned the offenders once, but as they still persisted, a charge was laid against them. One of the number appeared to represent his associates in the District Court this morning, and pleaded guilty to the charge. He promised that in future the Japanese would observe the laws governing the disposal of offal, and asked for leniency. Magistrate Pittendrigh took the promise into consideration in giving the sentence, and did not impose the maximum fine of \$100.
