When I came home last evening I saw the Hindus all camped along the road; shivering in the frosty right air. This kind of strocity is permitted in a civilized country, it appears. I took action at once by if appears. I took action at once by arranging to Louise a number of them for the hight: To-day we fixed up temporary shelter for the poor fellows, and they will stay at my place until they find some better thousing. I do not care what the members of the Council think about it. I am against the Hindus being allowed in the vichilty at all, but in the name of humanity we must keep them from freez ing to death."

The South Vancouver authorities communicated with her, as the result of which action sho repudiated the lease and directed the Hindus to be turned out. The firm would repay the Hindu the rent paid.
