



WITH WIP'S HANDS CHICAGO REDS ARRESTED TO-DAY

at Foot of Two Men Are Charged with

Chicago, March 4.—Chas. Yanlatis, 32 years old, and William Stadlweiser, 34 years old, alleged anarchists, were arrested to-day in connection with the attempted assassination of Chief of Police Shippy.

Chicago, March 4.—Lazarus Averbach, the young Russian anarchist who attempted to assassinate Chief of Police Shippy and was himself slain, was one of the body of men who called upon Corporation Counsel Brundage several weeks ago to secure permission for the parade of the "unemployed." This permission was denied, because it was believed it would bring about a clash between the "Reds" and the police.

MULOCK MAY BE NEW CHAIRMAN

He May Succeed Late Chief Justice Killam at Head of Railway Commission—Funeral at Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, March 4.—(Special.)—The body of the late Judge Killam arrived here this morning from Ottawa, accompanied by his son, George K. Killam, who left here on Monday to meet the funeral car. The remains will be taken to the family residence on Rosslyn road and the funeral will be held to-morrow afternoon from the house to All Saints Church, where Archbishop Matheson will officiate. Thence the cortege will make its way to St. John's Cathedral in the ancient city of which the burial will take place.

FIFTEEN HINDUS THROWN INTO JAIL

Failed to Pass Natal Act Tests and Will Appeal in the Police Court.

"Yes, sahib, it is an order and we will obey; but why should we be stopped when Chinese and Japanese can come in?"

This was the question propounded yesterday afternoon at the C. P. R. detention shed by Hara Singh, one of the fifteen Hindus refused admission under the Natal Act.

Provincial Officer Munro wished to escort them on board the Empress of Japan pending deportation, but the C. P. R. absolutely refused to accept delivery and so the officer and his Hindus had to wait on the wharf while telephone calls to headquarters were put through.

"Will you go back to the ship?" asked the interpreter.

There was a vigorous shaking of heads, and Hara Singh, who seemed to be the leader of the party, said that sooner than go on board the Empress of Japan again they would jump into the water.

Then they were told that they would have to be put under arrest. To-morrow morning the men will appear before Magistrate Williams on charges of being illegally in the country. Mr. A. D. Taylor will prosecute on behalf of the provincial Government.

ACCIDENT ON HIGH SCHOOL GROUNDS

A. Sanderson, a student at the High School, was badly injured at noon to-day while playing with his fellows in the vicinity of the school grounds. A number of the boys were throwing stones, and a large one struck young Sanderson on the side of the head with great violence. He fell to the ground unconscious, and it was seen in a few moments that he was seriously injured. The ambulance was summoned and took the lad to St. Paul's Hospital. There it was found he was badly injured, as hemorrhages had resulted from the blow. The parents of the youth live at Cardero and Pender streets.
