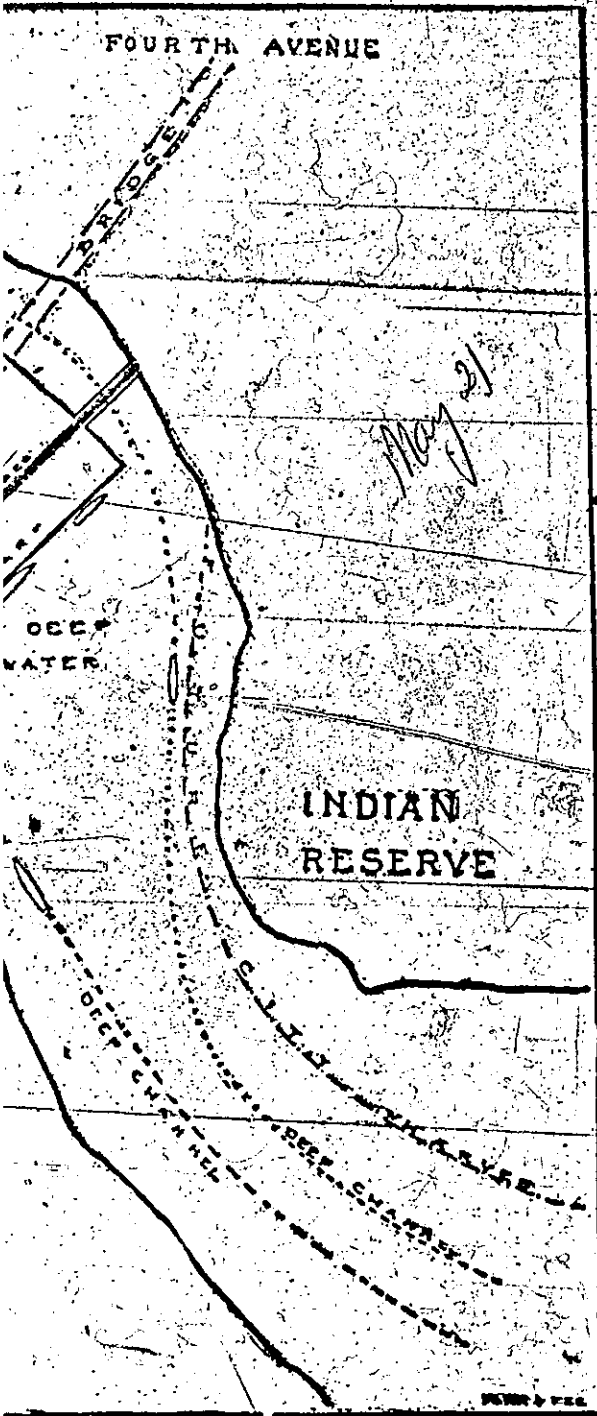

HINDUS HERE HELPING  
INSURRECTION IN  
INDIA

Recent Bomb Outrages in Cal-  
cutta Were Directed From  
This Coast

SEDITION OPENLY TAUGHT.

Send Money Home While  
Scores of Countrymen Are  
Destitute In Vancouver.

That Hindus resident in British Columbia are actively assisting their countrymen at home in acts of insurrection against the British Government, is confidently said to be a fact by persons who are closely in touch with the immigration situation in British Columbia.

One other startling fact has been demonstrated which is that the recent bomb outrages in Calcutta have been indirectly fostered in Pacific coast cities of the United States. From investigations made, there appears to be no reasonable doubt but that Hindus in Bellingham and Seattle furnished their "brothers" at home with the recipes for the making of the bombs which were recently used.

Aside from the evidence collected in this city, there is the additional fact that the traits of the Hindus are all of such a character that color is lent to the proposition that the information which led to the making of the bombs all came from this side of the Pacific Ocean.

By nature and training, the Hindus avoid the handling of explosives, and it is significant that bomb outrages were never heard of in India before this year.

It is a fact, too, so common that every official who has anything to do with the Hindus, possesses the information that sedition is rife amongst the Hindus in British Columbia towns, and that in their schools and meetings, anti-British sentiment is openly inculcated.

While Hindus in Vancouver are daily going from house to house begging for money and food, thousands of dollars every month are being sent from Vancouver and Seattle to India to friends or relatives of the men who are here. This money undoubtedly comes, of course, from the earlier arrivals in British Columbia and the State of Washington, who are making good wages in mills and camps; but it is certain that hundreds of dollars every week are being sent away while scores of the Hindus now here are destitute and practically a charge on the community.

COAST RESOURCES  
THIS YEAR

Federal Government Arranges  
Work For Number of Large  
Parties.

Other Geological Examinations  
of Kingcombe Inlet and  
Vancouver Island.

The geological survey branch of the Dominion Government Mines Department will do much work in Western Canada this year. The programme laid out by Mr. R. W. Brock, the capable director, is important from the British Columbia standpoint.

Much interesting work is contemplated in the North. Mr. D. D. Cairnes will spend the summer in the White Pass coal area, delimiting the coal-bearing rocks.

Just north of Vancouver, two parties will be in the field. One will be headed by Mr. R. C. McConnell, who will make a detailed examination of Texada Island, with special attention to the ore deposits. Not only copper, but iron ore as well as coal, will be examined. Mr. McConnell's headquarters will naturally be in Vancouver.

Mr. R. Graham will work further north in Gulf of Georgia waters. He will make a geological study of the coast from Kingcombe Inlet northward.

Vancouver Island.—Mr. C. C. Clapp.—Work will be commenced at the south end of the island and continued northward. It is hoped that it will be possible to have the work go on from year to year until the whole island is surveyed.

Continental Divide near Head of Pelly River.—Mr. J. Keele.—Mr. Keele was engaged in this exploration last season and wintered on the ground. It is expected that this season he will be able to explore the Mackenzie slope of the divide.

Bulkley Valley.—Mr. W. W. Leach.—Mr. Leach will continue his exploratory work in the Bulkley Valley.

Camp Hedley and Tulameen District.—Mr. C. Camisell.—Mr. Camisell will complete his survey of Camp Hedley and commence a survey of the Tulameen district.

Phoenix.—Messrs. Lefroi and Boyd.—Mr. Boyd will make a detailed topographic map of this camp and Mr. Lefroi a detailed survey of the geological structure of the productive area.

Slocan.—It is hoped that the work in Phoenix will be completed in time to allow Messrs. Lefroi and Boyd to begin a detailed survey of the Slocan district.

Brazeau River, Alta.—Mr. D. R. Dowling.—Mr. Dowling will examine the newly-discovered coal region of the Brazeau River.

There will also be some botanical and natural history work done in British Columbia by the survey. Mr. John Macoun will investigate the fungi which cause the rapid decay of mine timbers, with the object of
