

VANCOUVER HINDUS AID PLOTTERS IN INDIA

Thousands of Dollars Sent
from British Columbia to
Headquarters.

MONEY TO BUY RIFLES

Evidence Gathered by Secret
Service Men Demonstrates
Extent of Seditious Move-
ment in This Province.

That the Hindu population of Vancouver and vicinity is being systematically milked for funds to assist in the most militant manner the anti-British plots woven in India by seditious agitators has lately been developed by secret service agents of the federal government employed at the instance of the India office in London. The most remarkable ramifications of the anarchistic schemes of these turbaned plotters in India have been discovered in Vancouver where the agents of the seditious movement have for the past few years been conducting their campaign with an openness which indicates little fear of detection or retribution.

As much as \$2000 has been raised in Vancouver on a single Sunday afternoon on a direct appeal to the Hindus employed in and about this city for funds with which to buy rifles to aid the plots to overthrow British rule in India. Those appealed to in this fashion readily respond and it is declared the most of the Hindu population of the province have been whipped into line as subscribers by the leaders of the movement, men whose educational attainments are largely the result of training in the native schools of India, which are fed by the hand of the government which they now seek to bite.

Funds Sent to London

The funds obtained in Vancouver and at other centers in British Columbia where Hindus are to be found in any number are forwarded to agents of the plotters in London, England. The destination of the funds was developed by the work of the secret service men in tracing the grafts dispatched from Vancouver. The London end of the string is in the hands of the India office. From Vancouver to this London agent sums as high as \$20,000 have been sent in one draft.

That all the money collected from the ignorant coolies in British Columbia by these unscrupulous agitators does not find its way into the coffers of the plotters at headquarters has also been established. Portions of the funds are skillfully deflected for the individual enrichment of the leaders whose "nationalist" spirit is not developed to that fanatical point where the good of the cause is subordinated to their personal greed.

While the majority of the Hindus in British Columbia are contributing to the support of the seditious movement in India not all are willingly bled; the fanatical hatred of the British makes many easy victims of the

PREPARING WAY FOR TOUR OF LAURIER

Senator Bostock and Ralph
Smith, M. P., Making Ar-
rangements Today.

New Westminster, June 1.—Senator Bostock and Mr. Ralph Smith, M. P., Nanaimo, are in the city today arranging for the western tour of Sir Wilfrid Laurier to be undertaken this summer.

The itinerary as originally announced gave the Premier twelve days in each of the three provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. This has been modified considerably.

Sir Wilfrid will be in Vancouver to attend the exhibition on Aug. 19. From here he will go to Prince Rupert and Victoria, returning to Vancouver Aug. 27. Meetings will subsequently be held in Vernon and Nelson and the Premier will return east to arrive in Ottawa Sept. 8.

The Liberals of the lower mainland will tender Sir Wilfrid a reception on the occasion of his second visit to Vancouver, when it is expected that representatives of all the Liberal associations will be present.

Borden Is Coming

Ottawa, June 1.—Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia, has caught the call of the West this year, and he will not be far behind Sir Wilfrid Laurier in reaching the Pacific Coast in August. It is Sir Frederick's intention to leave Ottawa for the West about August 20, and he expects to reach Vancouver about the last of the month. He will stay a few days in Winnipeg on his way to the Coast. Sir Frederick will join Sir Wilfrid and his party somewhere on the Coast, and will probably return to Ottawa in company with the prime minister.

MISSILE THROWN AT GERMAN CROWN PRINCE

What Was Feared to Be Bo
Turned Out to Be Merely T
Can Full of Beans.

Berlin, June 1.—There was a commotion among the royal party returning from the annual joint review of the Berlin and Potsdam garrisons at the Tempelhof Field today when a man who had followed at a distance hurled a missile at Crown Prince Frederick William.

The object missed its mark and harmless at the feet of a policeman. It was found to be an ordinary tin can and was filled with uncooked beans. The party was about to enter the palace at the time and for a moment it was thought a bomb had been thrown.

The police seized the assailant, who proved to be a Russian named Elweiss, a resident of this city. It thought he is not responsible for the action.

The Crown Prince represented the Emperor at the review as the absence on the Emperor's right wrist is so troubling him.

RUSSIAN REVOLUTIONIST

227 Accused Militiamen Will Be Tried by Military Law.

Riga, Russia, Tuesday, May 17.—The trial of the so-called Frantzenburg Center, the last big case connected with the revolution of 1905, involving 227 accused persons, will begin in a few weeks before the military district.

The accused are charged with membership in the revolutionary militia which attacked the sub-treasury at Hazen Port, entered in operation against Russian troops and committed many outrages on local landowners. The leaders were shot by punitive expeditions which pacified the Baltic provinces, and eleven others were condemned by court-martial.

The present accused men constitute the rank and file of the militia. There are over 200 witnesses to be called.

LOCOMOTIVE EXPLODES

Three Men Killed in Terrible Accident in Illinois.

St. Louis, June 1.—Three men were killed when a railroad locomotive exploded near Collinsville Junction, Ill., on the tracks of the St. Louis-Troy & Eastern Railroad today.

FIRE RAVAGES VILLAGE

Small Hamlet on Columbia River
Wiped Out by Conflagration

Portland, June 1.—Passengers arriving here on the Astoria & Columbia River Railroad from Astoria early today, state that the village of Ingila, about fifty miles up the Columbia River from here, was practically wiped out late last night by fire.

The sawmill and yards of the Oregon Lumber Company were destroyed, and six houses had burned when the train succeeded in getting by the village. The fire was at that time still burning furiously. The loss, it is stated, will run well into the thousands of dollars.

Telegraph and telephone wires are down, and it is impossible to learn further details.

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
