He protested vehemently against such language and quoted a pastoral letter Bishop Plessis, former metropolitan of the Catholic Church in Canada, in which a great eulogy of Great Britain's fair play and equanimity towards French-Canadians was stated as something unique in the history of the world. The Liberal speaker went on to explain the navy bill and contended that the oppositionists of all ages had no right to criticize the principle of which they voted unanimously in parliament when the resolution was adopted in March, 1909.

Mr. Laverge Denies Disloyalty.
Mr. Laverge was the next speaker and gave a denial to Mr. Beland's charge of disloyalty towards England. "That we said," he stated, "is that we want the English people to react on us. We shall always stand like men and give freely our opinion even when we know they are opposed to it. We are ready to submit if the electorate of Canada is against our anti-naval policy. But we want to be sure if we are or are not."

REST TORONTO ELOPERS
Alleged to Be Burglar Held at Baltimore, Md.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 3.—The police in this city believe they have in custody a genuine "Raffles" in the person of Thomas N. Barnett, alias ap. of Toronto, Ont., who is held on the charge of having robbed the residence of Howard Kellogg at 400 on September 9. Also in custody is Miss Florence Elinson, aged 18, who is said to be daughter of a railroad official living in Toronto. Miss Tomlinson and Nett eloped from Toronto and on Monday she believed they had been married in New York State. This had been a mock marriage eloped after Barnett's arrest, when he was charged that a minister be sent for to marry him to the girl. She was confessed, the police say, to a number of burglaries. Miss Tomlinson's father has been notified of his daughter's plight.

Widespread Smuggling Plot.
New York, Nov. 3.—Every port from Maine to Florida is being scourged by government agents today to break an alleged widespread plot to smuggle Chinese into Eastern ship-centers. The watch for Chinamen is the result of a confession alleged to have been made by Tong Wan, a former government in-lieu. Wan was arrested some time ago on a charge of being implicated in a smuggling conspiracy.

Sample Pills Prove Fatal.
Portland, Ore., Nov. 3.—Esther, 13, 7 years old, is dead from eating samples from a bottle of pills and children of the public school sick from the same cause. The pills, which were sugar-coated, had left about the city by agents. Investigation is now under way.

LAW'S DELAY GIVES RESPITE TO RAHIM

Hindu Will Not Be Deported Tomorrow, as Case Is Unheard.

H. Rahim, manager of the Canada India Supply & Trust Company, a Hindu, whose deportation has been ordered by the Dominion immigration authorities, will probably not sail for Honolulu tomorrow, the date first set for his departure. The law's delay will give him a respite.

When habeas corpus proceedings were commenced by Rahim, and an order nisi was issued by the court, it was impossible to find a Supreme Court justice before whom the case might be argued. Mr. Justice Murphy was presiding at the New Westminster assizes and so unattainable. The result is that the deportation of Rahim, if he is to be deported, must be adjourned until he has had a hearing. Rahim is at present out on a cash bail of \$1000.

MEXICAN'S BODY STOLEN

Indians Believed to Have Desecrated Remains of Iron-handed Ruler.

Elisbee, Ariz., Nov. 3.—The rumor of theft of the body of former Governor Rafael Yzabel of Sonora from the cemetery at Hermosillo, the capital of the Mexican State, grows stronger, but it is impossible to confirm it at present. Mexican officials apparently are keeping the matter quiet as much as possible. The report is generally believed on both sides of the border, however, as Yzabel, during the Yaqui uprisings, suppressed the Indians with an iron hand. Vows of vengeance were made at the time by the Yaquis, which included threats of desecration of the body of Yzabel should it fall into their hands dead or alive.

The Rand will be visited Nov. 28. On Dec. 1 the royal party will be at Pietermaritzburg and will sail from Durban Dec. 2.

MOND ON FREE TRADE

Sir Alfred Gives Opinions Again on Canadian Situation.

London, Nov. 3.—Sir Alfred Mond, M. P., in the course of an interview in the Leader, says the people of England should not take their views of Canadian questions from Toronto. That city is headquarters for the Conservative Protectionist party. Most of the opinion coming from there is colored by self-interest. Sir Alfred found that in Eastern Canada comparatively little was known of the strength of the movement in the West towards free trade. Yet he was surprised at the number of free traders in Eastern Canada. He says he was still more surprised at the fact that leading and most influential newspapers in that part of the Dominion were free trade papers.

The Morning Post, commenting on the opinions expressed in the Leader interview, says:

"It is now realized that the vociferous assertion here of a sweeping free trade agitation in Canada is a record achievement in political bunkum. A typical pillar of this glorious cause is Sir Alfred Mond."

Asks for Experiment Farm

FRESH ARREST IN WOODWORTH CASE

James R. Wort Was Taken into Custody Early This Afternoon.

James Reginald Wort of Cambie street, was arrested about 6 o'clock this afternoon on a long charge in connection with the pending against Richard Berryman who is accused of the murder of J. P. Mott Woodworth.

At the coroner's inquest held the body of the dead woman yesterday afternoon, her husband in attendance, stated that there was a young man who had brought him drugs his wife about six weeks ago, whose name or address he could remember. Mr. Woodworth also stated that this man had brought drugs to him from Mrs. Morse, who is a held at the police station in connection with the case.

Acting on this information the detectives began last night to scour the city for the young man mentioned Mr. Woodworth, and this afternoon Detectives Jewitt and O'Grady located him. He was placed under arrest and is now in the lock-up pending a first hearing before the magistrate tomorrow morning.

The officers handling the case believe that with the arrest of Wort they have completed the chain of evidence which will lead to a thorough unravelling of the circumstances which led up to the death of Mr. Woodworth.

SUES TACOMA FOR \$10,000

Father of Boy Who Hanged Himself Charges Neglect by City Officials.

Tacoma, Nov. 3.—Charging gross negligence on the part of city officials for not answering the cries of his son Frank, aged 14, who hanged himself in the city jail last week, Alton Ketsoe has brought suit against the city for \$10,000. Young Ketsoe was found hanging from a steam pipe in the woman's ward. It is said he committed suicide through fear of the police officers had threatened him with a prison sentence after they used the "third degree." He left a note scribbled on his cell wall for his mother.
