

## GRAND JURY TO LOOK INTO BRIBERY CHARGE

### Interest in the McNamara Case Turns In a New Direction.

Los Angeles, Nov. 29.—District Attorney John D. Frederick today announced that a grand jury would be called in a few days to investigate the alleged attempts at bribery in the McNamara case for which Bert H. Franklin, a former deputy United States marshal, is now under arrest.

The actual summoning of a grand jury is in the hands of the presiding judge of the Superior Court, but it is customary to act on the recommendation of the district attorney. At any rate the law requires that a grand jury be summoned once a year. The grand jury which investigated the Times dynamiting was that of 1910 and it held over until 1911. This year's grand jury therefore remains to be called and it was said that the call might issue next Monday.

Judge McCormick in the Superior Court today announced the dismissal as a juror of "Cap" White, one of the men arrested yesterday with Franklin and later released by the state which asserts that he was stakeholder between Franklin and George N. Lockwood, the man Franklin is accused of bribing.

## STRIKES HEAD AND DROWNS

### Wireless Man on Steamer Watson Lost Life at South Valejo.

Tacoma, Nov. 29.—The steamship Watson of the Alaska Pacific Steamship Company arrived in port this morning with the news that Carl Roe, her wireless operator, was drowned at South Valejo, Cal., just before the vessel's departure north. Roe jumped from the vessel to a scow lying alongside, missed his footing and disappeared in the water. It is believed his head struck the scow and that he sank like a stone. Efforts to recover the body failed. Roe was twenty-one years of age. His home was in Bend, Ore. He was well known to the waterfront men in Seattle and Tacoma.

## ALLOW HINDUS TO BRING IN WIVES

### Arrangement May Be Made by Which Families Will Be Admitted.

### This Likely to Be Sole Concession Made by Government at Present.

Ottawa, Nov. 29.—It is understood that as a result of a conference between the Hindu delegation now in Ottawa and the British Columbia members, held in the office of Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of the interior, this morning, it is possible that an arrangement may be arrived at under which Hindus now in British Columbia will be allowed, under strict regulations, to bring their wives and families to Canada. While the British Columbia members, and many eastern members, agree with much that has been said in favor of Hindus and acknowledge their claims as citizens of the Empire, they point out that they might soon over-run the coast if the existing regulations were relaxed. They recognized that it is a question of great importance, which must be taken up with imperial authorities before a solution can be arrived at.

The delegation, in addition to asking for permission to bring their wives to Canada, practically asked for the abolition of all the regulations adopted by the immigration department, some time ago, to restrict Asiatic immigration, including the provision that Hindus who come to Canada must come direct from India. This they said was impossible because there is no direct steamship service. They asked that the amount required from Hindus entering the country shall be made uniform with other nationalities and that the present \$200 requirement be abolished. They undertook to give a bond that no Hindu shall become a public charge in Canada.

The matter was thoroughly discussed in the presence of Mr. W. D. Scott, commissioner of immigration, and Mr. W. W. Cory, deputy minister of the interior, and the minister promised careful consideration. The concession mentioned above, however, is likely to be the only one granted until the matter has been taken up with the Imperial authorities.

## CHAUFFEUR SENTENCED

### Seven Months for Man Who Ran Down Woman in Toronto.

Toronto, Nov. 29.—Roy Brimtnell, who was found guilty of wilful neglect in running down and killing Mrs. Salter while driving his automobile on Yonge street on Oct. 5, was today sentenced to seven months in jail. A largely signed petition for leniency had been presented in his behalf.

## ARE READY TO HURL THOUSANDS OF BOMBS

### Sunday's Riots in Lisbon Only the Beginning of Trouble in Portugal.

Lisbon, Nov. 29.—The opinion generally prevails that the disorders which occurred here on Sunday were only preliminary to more serious events. Among the wounded on that occasion were twenty-one soldiers and it is believed that the total number of wounded far exceeds the government estimate.

The rioting was started by monarchists, who recently arrived at Oporto. It is declared that they are bribing the monarchist element and preparing for an uprising in Lisbon to coincide with the crossing of the frontier by the royalists. The carbonaries, members of an advanced political society, boast of the possession of thousands of bombs which they intend to hurl from windows and roofs in case trouble should occur.

The authorities entered and closed today what they found to be a secret monastery of the Order of the Holy Spirit, composed of foreign friars. They arrested 52 inmates and confiscated tapestry and ornaments of an estimated value of \$3,000,000.

## RUSSIA DECLARES SHUSTER MUST GO

### Is About to Demand Resignation of Persia's Financial Adviser.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 29.—Russia is about to demand the resignation of W. Morgan Shuster, the American financial adviser to the Government of Persia. This demand is contained in the instructions which the foreign office has forwarded to the Russian minister at Teheran, M. Pokrowski-Kozel, concerning the supplementary demands which Russia is making on Persia to recoup her for the cost of sending troops to that country.
