In their affidavits both men state that they tried at Calcutta and at Rangoon, the two principal scaports of India, to secure tickets for a direcpassage from India to Canada, offering to prepay a full passage, but that it was impossible to purchase tickets as there is no direct line of steamers from India to Canada. They claim that it was physically impossible to comply with the conditions laid down by the immigration authorities so they compiled with its spirit as best they could by coming by the shortest and most direct route.

Following their arrival, both women were released on bail bonds to appear in time for the return of the steamer Monteagle. The Monteagle is to leave on Wednesday on her return voyage. Mr. G. E. McCrossan has been retained by the Hindus to appear and argue their case.
