

Government Has No Intention of Receding from Its Fixed Position.

He again urged that the Hindus should be allowed to enter the Dominshould be allowed to enter the Dominlon on the grounds of their British
citizenship, and the fact that most of
those on board the Komegata Maru
were old Sikh soldiers. While no
threats were made, it was intimated
that if the Hindus were not allowed
to enter Canada freely it might add to
the unrest in India. Dr. Singh again
strongly urged that a Royal Commission he appointed to consider the
whole question of immigration from
India to Canada. It is understood that
the government has no intention of
receding from Ma position, and the India to Canada. It is understood that the government has no intention of receding from Re position, and the law will be carried out to the letter in regard to the Hindus now quarac-tined at Vancouver. There is practi-cally no chance of their being allowed to enise.

While they may evade the order-incouncil prohibiting the entrance of all artisans and laborers into British Columbia on the grounds that they are farmers, they will be shut out under the regulation that they have not come by direct passage. The Hindus theoretes admit that they did not sail direct from India. A wire has been received from the counsel of the Hindus at Vancouver, asking that a number of those on board the ship be allowed to land for consultation purposes. He was notified that the question was entirely in the hands of Mr. Malcolm Reid, immigration agent at the coast.

The whole matter in regard to the question of the shipload of Hindus on board the Komagata Maru who are clamoring for admission to British Columbia may be fought out before the Court of Appeal at Victoria next week. This was decided at a conference held yesterday in the offices of Mesars, and, Reld & Wallbridge, between Mr. W. B. A. Ritchie, K.C., counsel
