Dominion Government - May Negotiate With Indian Government, Says Stevens.

Vancouver Member is Back from Ottawa-Pleased With Redistribution.

With a view of effecting a permanent solution of the vexatious Hindu immigration problem, the Dominion Government may enter into an arrangement with the Indian Government similar to the treaty which controis the number of settlers allowed into this country from Japan. Mr. H. H, Stevens, M, P., who returned to Vancouver from Olfawa this morning, following the prorogation of Parliament, stated the question of placing the control of immigration to Canada

following the proregation of Parliament, stated the question of placing the control of immigration to Canada in the hands of the Indian authorities has been funder advisement for a me time, and that he has been strongly urging the adoption of such a plan, "The Dominion authorities are absolutely determined that the law with reference to the admission of Hindus shall be strictly enforced," replied Mr. Rievena, when asked how the situation stood at present. "The delay in returning the Kamagata Maru is caused by the belligerent attitude adopted by the natives themselves, who are asking for special privileges and are trying to evade the regulations. "I am convinced that the placing
