\$1500 FOUND BY MISTAKE

Frederick Man Discovers Old Deposit by Going to Wrong Bank.
Frederick, Md., June 18.—A mistake of A. M. Whitehall of Union Bridge, in going into the wrong bank in this city reveals to him a deposit of \$1000 and interest, amounting to nearly \$1500, which for years has awaited his identity.
About seventeen years ago his mother, Mrs. Sarah E. Whitehall, deposited \$1000 in the Frederick County National Bank. Three years later she died, without withdrawing the principal or interest. The bank officials made enquiries, but the owner of the deposit could not be found.
Mr. Whitehall had business at the Farmers and Mechanics Bank. Instead, however, he went to the Frederick County Bank, and after making himself known, was asked concerning the amount to the credit of Mrs. Sarah Whitehall. In order to obtain the money Mr. Whitehall and his sister, who will share it equally, but administer upon the estate through the court.

CLUBMAN TAKES ODD BATH

Water From Water Tank Drenches Him, But He Likes It.
Richmond, Ind., June 19.—One member of the Lamb's Club of New York, now on its annual "sambol" through the Central West, gave about 400 persons in the Pennsylvania station and on North E street here an exhibition they will never forget.
When the train bearing the Lamb's Club members to Indianapolis came to a stop in the station a man clad only in a raincoat stepped off a Pullman and climbed on the engine. The then discarded the raincoat and stepped under a stream of water from a stand pipe, which was "feeding" the locomotive. The spectators gasped and women shrieked. The bather, for two or three minutes calmly stamped about under the cold stream. Finally he put on his raincoat and descended to the station platform.
An indignant station master and a police officer dashed into the train, but too late to apprehend the bather, whose name could not be ascertained. The Lamb's gave their reckless brother member an ovation when he returned to the Pullman.

The collie hit the pole with terrific force. His skull was crushed and his neck broken.

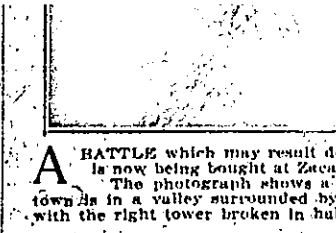
24 YEARS' ALIMONY ASKED

She was granted her divorce decree in 1895, with \$5 a week alimony, but Taylor disappeared.

this movement in Benall, named Hash Bahari Bose. This man has not yet been apprehended, and the government have offered a large reward for his arrest. Hitherto the terrorist movement was confined principally to the Province of Bengal, and the present enquiry went to show that those responsible for the introduction of this anarchistic propaganda from Bengal into Northern India. The other conspirators were to be the heads of the Punjab and United Provinces movement; but nothing was to be done without consulting Bose.
In furtherance of the aims of the conspiracy, bombs were secured by members, and one of these used in Lahore, which resulted in the death of one of their own countrymen, a servant of the Gymkhana. The element of religion was introduced into this movement, and Bose preached, that a man should be ready to sacrifice his life in such work and that if he did so, he would be given a good birth in the transmigration of his soul.

Literature is Circulated.
A large amount of seditious literature was printed and circulated in the Punjab. Members were set to reading literature such as: "The Life of Michael Davitt," "The Career of a Nihilist," and "The Confessions of a Nihilist," etc. From sources outside of India, namely San Francisco and points in British Columbia, large numbers of the Hindu newspaper called the Ghadar, or Mutiny, were received and distributed at large by members of this band.
Shortly after the arrest of these people, one of them confessed and was granted a pardon. This man's evidence was corroborated in nearly every detail before he was put up to give evidence. He was Dina Nath, head of the terrorist movement for Northern India. He made a full confession and in doing so disclosed the whole undertaking. He was one of the men present when they undertook to blow up the gymkhana at Lahore, at a time when this club was full of military and civil officers. It was also the intention of the conspirators to throw a bomb at Lord Harding, Viceroy of India, during his visit to Kapurthala, a native state, in December, 1912. It will be remembered that some time ago the United States immigration officers in San Francisco arrested an alleged notorious Hindu revolutionary named Har Dayal and rather than face deportation proceedings Har Dayal shipped the country and forfeited the sum of \$1000 bail. The police conducting the investigation in the Indian conspiracy found that Har Dayal was in constant communication with the leaders of this movement, and in particular with one of the accused, Amir Chand, formerly a teacher in the St. Stephen's School at Delhi, where Har Dayal received his elementary education.

Poisons Were Described.
In the course of house searches conducted by the police, bombs and parts of bombs were found in Amir Chand's house, as also in the house of three or four of the other conspirators. A large amount of seditious literature ready for distribution and in the course of preparation was seized by the police. Among the documents seized was a Hindu manuscript dealing with the use of poisons for political purposes, and when read can only be described as diabolical in its nature. It details methods for administration of poisons to the English people and to those who favor English rule, as also methods for perpetrating robberies with the object of obtaining money for political purposes. Another document, which was proved to be in the handwriting of Amir Chand, advocated the massacre of Europeans, especially the English, all over India.
To what an extent the funds of the terrorist organization are augmented by robberies and murder, was partly disclosed by the confession of another of the accused. It would appear that four of the members were deputed to obtain by fair means or foul, funds for the treasury. These men went miles and miles away from headquarters to a place called Arrah in the United Provinces, where they murdered a non-suspecting Hindu priest in his temple, as also a young lad, the servant of the priest, and secured a large sum of money. When the murder was discovered, investigations disclosed that strangers had been seen in the temple, and in the course of other enquiries the police arrested the four, one of them Dina Nath, confessed and disclosed the link between this murder and the activities of the terrorists in Delhi.

HENNIKER HEATON HAS NEW REFORM

Would Appoint a Postmaster-general for Entire Empire.

Suggests Conference on Uniform Cable Rate of a Penny a Word.

London, June 19.—Sir John Henniker Heaton (the veteran postal reformer, whose energetic influence has produced many reforms in the British postal service, has now written to Rt. Hon. Charles Hothhouse, postmaster general, urging the appointment of an imperial postmaster general.
"Our postmaster general," Sir Henniker declares, "have reluctantly followed rather than led their colonial colleagues. Their most egregious failure has been with the cable service of which they have allowed a small combination of astute speculators to acquire control for their own profit and to the detriment of the Empire. What is wanted is a minister of rank as high and independent that he will be able to face the most penurious chancellor of the exchequer and insist on the realization of all postal, telegraphic and cable reforms required in the interests of the Empire."
Sir Henniker concludes by advocating a conference of the postmaster general of the dominions overseas and the United States to confer with the imperial postmaster general on the establishment of a uniform cable rate of one penny a word throughout the British Empire and the United States. Another step is to assemble the world's postmasters general for the purpose of considering the institution of universal penny letter postage and universal penny a word cable when mailed from the cable station.

Had But One Vote.
New York, June 19.—The Democratic state conference in session here today mustered only one vote for a proposition that the party place itself on record at the approaching primaries as either for or against Tammany Hall. Montgomery Hure, who proposed the resolution, was the only delegate who voted in the affirmative.

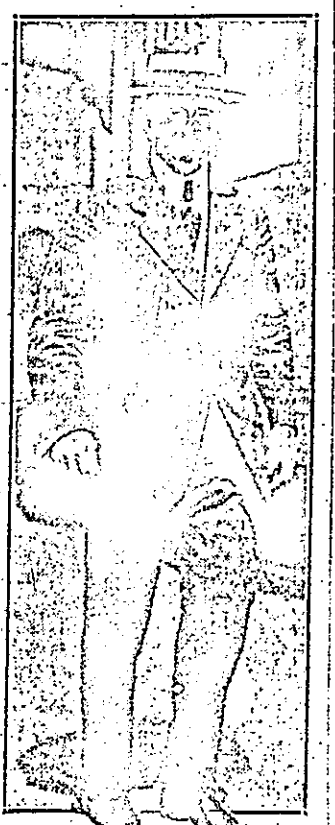
while at school in Lahore, a disciple of Har Dayal. Har Dayal left for England; but one of his followers handed over his disciples to Amir Chand. Har Dayal having disciples in India, naturally took it on himself to furnish them with all kinds of literature and in furtherance of this object, he published a Hindu newspaper called "The Mutiny" in San Francisco. The introduction of this paper into India is prohibited by the Customs Act of India, but the revolutionary society in the United States found a means of introducing this literature in letter form by sending them to Vancouver, Victoria and in the course of time, the copies were transmitted to friends in India.
All the accused have been committed for trial at the next Sessions Court of Delhi, and in the meantime a wide search is being made for the arch-conspirator Bose.

COAL MINERS ARE TRAPPED BY FIRE

Two Hundred of Them Caught in a Belgian Colliery.

Liège, Belgium, June 19.—Two hundred coal miners were entombed in the Vieille-Marthaye colliery near here, when fire broke out today. Two hundred of their comrades escaped when the alarm was given.
The fire was still raging this afternoon and every effort was being made to rescue the miners left in the pits.

May Become Provisional President



LUIS CABRERA, one of the members of the Constitutionalist agency in the United States, and a man who is looked on as being among the first in Mexico, has been discussed among the mediators at Niagara Falls for the provisional presidency of Mexico, should General Huerta get out as a result of the negotiations there. He has just been named for minister of foreign affairs by Carranza in the preliminary statement of the membership of the new Constitutionalist cabinet. At this time Cabrera is in Washington where he is hard at work for the Constitutionalist cause.

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
