## THE MINE DISASTER.

One of the greatest disasters in the history of Canadian coal mining has taken place at Hillcrest, Alta. . It is reported that at least 195 miners have met their death in the explosion which took place yesterday. As the mine appears to have caught on fire afterwards hardly any had a chance of escape as they were working about 1200 feet below the surface. No doubt an enquiry will be held as to the cause of the explosion, but an enquiry while it fulfills its purpose in explaining the cause does not help to mend matters for those whose homes and families have, been robbed of their breadwinners by the disaster. The rescue gangs worked hard endeavoring to get men out of the mine, and out of 236 who went down about forty appears to have been sayed. These rescue gangs made up of the miners themselves invariably face the most terrible danger after an explosion of this nature. But they never hesitate and often many of them lose their own-lives in attempting to rescue their fellow workmen Fortunately the rescue work does not seem to have added to the death roll
