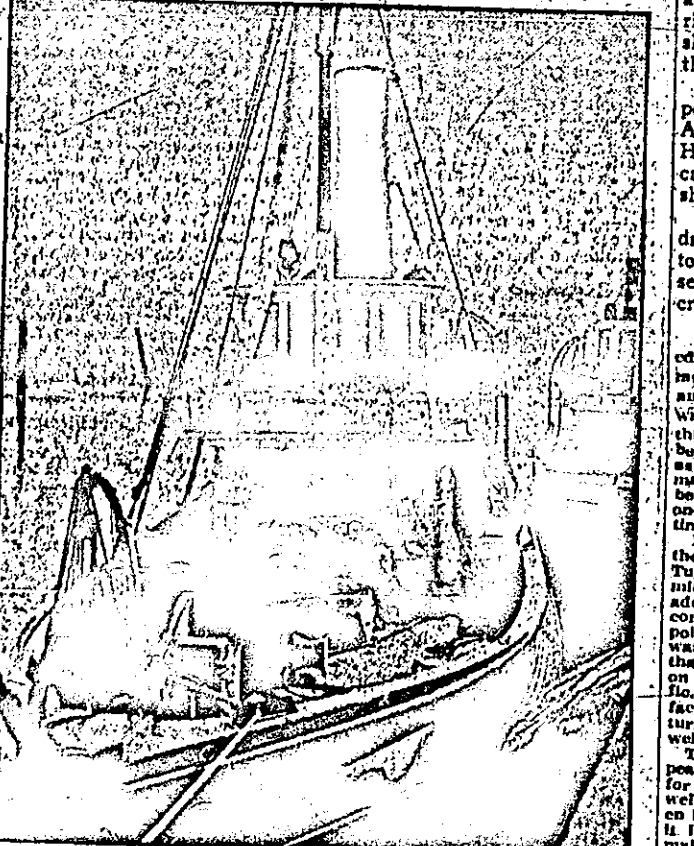
MILITIA CALLED FOR TUESDAY MORNING

Irish Fusiliers and Sixth Regiment to Muster for Service on the Rainbow—Men Are to Be Ready for Action—To Escort Hindus Out of Harbor.

The Sixth Regiment and the Irish Fusiliers have been called out for duty tomorrow morning in connection with the proposed descent on the Komagata Maru. The Sixth has been called to be on hand at the drill hall at 7 a.m. They will then go on board the Rainbow which it is proposed will escort the Komagata Maru out of the harbor. The Fusiliers have been ordered by Col. McSpadden to report at the Grandview hall at 6 a.m. and an hour later they will join the Sixth at the drill hall. There is to be a full muster of nearly 1000 men of the regiments and they are ordered to be ready for action.

The Fusiliers are to receive their rifles at the Grandview headquarters before marching to meet the Sixth at the drill hall.

BRING RAINBOW TO SUPPRESS UNRULY HINDUS

Big Force of Regular Service Men Arrived Today and Battle Cruiser Will Be Brought Across the Gulf to Be Ready for Action.

Duke of Connaught Sends Personal Telegram to Hindus, But Men on Komagata Maru Are Still Fiercely Showing Fight.

Victoria, July 20.—The cruiser Rainbow will probably leave tonight at 10 o'clock for Vancouver, after taking aboard her new crew. The investment of the Hindu ship may then occur tomorrow.

Because of the present state of the hull of the Rainbow, there was some doubt expressed at the navy yard in Esquimalt this morning that the vessel will be able to sail for Vancouver tonight to take a hand in the quelling of the angry Hindus on board the Komagata Maru.

Following the receipt of orders from the naval department at Ottawa last night to have the cruiser Rainbow provisioned and made ready to proceed to Vancouver at a moment's notice, the coaling wharf at Esquimalt this morning was the scene of much animation. Blue-jackets and yard hands were working hard placing stores aboard and getting the ship ready to steam from the harbor to enforce the orders of the immigration department officials on the Japanese steamer Komagata Maru, which carries a contingent of Hindus who are causing much trouble at the present time.

Early this morning several divers donned their suits and helmets and went below to look over the bottom of the cruiser. She has been riding to her buoy for some months and her hull is very dirty and a slight leak was discovered. The submarine workers removed some of the sea growth and reported the hull in good shape.

If the Rainbow departs at 10 o'clock tonight, as has been reported, she will reach Vancouver about 3:30 o'clock in the morning. A contingent of officers and bluejackets from the cruiser Niobe at Halifax arrived in port this afternoon and joined the Rainbow. The cruiser will carry 160 officers and men, under Commander Hose, when she clears for Vancouver.

Upon her return from Vancouver the Rainbow will be placed in drydock for repairs and a thorough overhaul, and will then proceed to Bering Sea to execute the patrol in compliance with the international sealing treaty. Fifty naval volunteers will join her for the northern cruise.

Japanese Consul T. A. Hori received cables from his government this morning to see that the Japanese crew of the Komagata Maru was not mixed up in any battle. To this end the whole Japanese crew will be taken off the ship until such time as the Rainbow bluejackets have the matter under control. The men will be brought ashore until the Hindus on the steamer have been brought to time.

Mr. C. Gardner Johnson, agent for the owners, and Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper, counsel for the owners, had a midday conference and the lawyer has addressed another letter to the Hindu committee on the Komagata Maru pointing out that the ship has all the water she needs, and assuring them that plenty of provisions will be put on board for the trip across the Pacific. The letter goes on to point out the fact that the Hindus will have to return and that therefore they might as well go peaceably.

The Hindus are not preparing for peace, however. They are preparing for war. Today the forward and after well decks on the vessel sport wooden barricades backed up with coal and it looks as if they are prepared to make a vigorous defence.

A night marked by ceaseless watching on the part of the immigration officials passed fairly peacefully aboard the Komagata Maru. Having repulsed the police early Sunday

Ottawa, July 20.—The only development here today in connection with the Hindu situation is that it is stated that the captain of the government vessel Rainbow has been advised to place himself at the service of the immigration authorities at Vancouver. The two hundred members of the crew of the Niobe who are en route to the coast are expected to reach their destination before the next attempt is made to bring about the deportation of the Hindus.

against the unwelcome immigrants that must be absolutely successful. It was later learned that the proposal is to bring the government cruiser Rainbow from Victoria, and with regular troops from Esquimalt, and other men of the permanent forces, assisted probably by the local police to provide such an overwhelming force that the Hindus will be overpowered. Eighty able bodied blue-jackets from the Niobe, under Commander Legge, came in on a special train at 10:30 o'clock this morning and immediately boarded the Princess Alice, which was placed at the disposal of authorities by the C. P. R. The Princess Alice left the C. P. R. docks at noon for Victoria. The blue-jackets will be placed on the Rainbow.
