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Thes authorities seem to have requested the captain of the Komagata Maru to leave Vancouver and Canadian waters. They were willing to provision the ship if the captain would take them away. The captain seems finally to have confessed that he was no longer in command and that the Hindus had selsed his ship. Whereupon acting quite properly the author. ities seem to have warned the Hindus to allow the captain to get up steam and added that if they interfered they would be forcibly restrained.

The Hindus refused, whereupon the authorities called in the city police to help and set out on a midnight expeditions to the ship. They probably considered there would be no real resistance but they took some rifles with them. They got alongside and were refused admittance, Someone apparently had thought of a hose and accordingly it was played on the Hindus lining the side of the ship. They retaliated with coal, brickbata wood and various other missiles which poured from their fortress above and very soon best off the attackers who retired with several casualties and a fortunate escape from real disaster.

Every effort is made to supply foreign news of all kinds, but naturally when it is re layed over a long series of wires each relay tends to have its own opinion of what is or is not nevs. Thus if there is a regular news service established between Canada and Great Britain it will be a great boon to all Canadians, and will please all those residing within her boundaries come from so many different corners of the earth, Moreover, it will broaden the aspect of life, and render it more interesting.

It is therefore doubly interesting to note that during one of the last sessions of the commission in England, Mr. Godfrey Issacs, managing direcfor of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company, made an interesting proposition.

"We propose," he said, "to offer to supply every newspaper throughout the country with news from Canada daily at a rate of one cent a word. and we propose to make the same offer to the Canadian papers of news from this country."

The present newspaper rate for cable messages from United the Kingdom to Canada is ten cents, per word.

This announcement of Mr. Issues indicates that his company is practically ready to link up the whole empire by means of wireless. Mr. Issace said that he had just been presiding at a meeting of the heads of the dopartments of the company with view to the organizing of a press ser vice from the United Kingdom Canada and from Canada to the United Kingdom at a halfpenny per word. He thought that there very little doubt that as stations are developed and constructed in other parts of the Empire the service would be still further developed.
