VEILED THREAT IS MADE BY HINDUS

Insinuated at Seattle that England May Regret Permitting Deportation.

Echo of the Komagata Maru Case May Sound Round World.

Seattle, Aug. 8.—A veiled insinuation, that England, in her present crisis, may regret having allowed Canada to deport the 352 Hindus who attempted to land from the Japanese steamer Komagata Maru at Vancouver a few weeks ago, is made in a printed pamphlet entitled "An Open Letter to the British Public by the Hindustanis of North America," which is signed by nine prominent Hindu business men and educators on the Pacific, including Nabhi Ram Joshi of Seattle and Surendra Nath Kerr, a student at the University of Washington.

"It may be that before another two weeks His Majesty's war office may have to issue orders that the Hindustani soldiers should bear the same burden as they did during the Boer troubles, Tibetan expedition, Afghan war, Crimean war, Egyptian war and Boer war," the pamphlet says.

"But just about this time, if these 352 Hindustanis returning to Hongkong can succeed in inducing at least the same number of their friends and relations who are now serving in the artillery, infantry and police forces, to desert their posts, what will be the moral effect of such an act?"

"Our demands are so simple and reasonable—unless it is the express wish of the British Government to completely ignore the interest of Hindustanis—that we are confident the outcome would be favorable. But our whole strength lies in the fact that the Hindustanis who have any self-respect will join us in our struggle to enforce our just demands in acquiring ordinary human rights."

FOODSTUFF PRICES MAY NOT ADVANCE

Opinion of Merchants that the Cost of Food Need Not Increase Greatly in City.

Weeks of staples and produce on hand in the city, according to retail merchants do not justify any great increase in prices at the present time on account of the war in Europe. That flour should not go up much in price on account of its being a common product was the opinion of one dealer yesterday. Yet market quotations showed that the retail price of that commodity had gone up 60 cents a barrel and sugar had gone up the same amount for 100 pounds.

WAR CAUSES MINERS TO DECLARE TRUCE

Nanaimo Workers Will Maintain Order to Relieve Militia.

A truce in the friction between the striking miners at Nanaimo and the mine owners has been called by the miners themselves on account of the war. A resolution passed on Thursday night by the Nanaimo local promises that the union will use its influence to "promote the peace and welfare of the community and maintain order, thereby relieving the military forces whose presence here is entirely unnecessary and uncalled for."

The miners at the same time protested against the filling of their places at the mines with men drawn from the very countries with which Great Britain was at war. "And we protest," the resolution adds, "against the maintenance of an armed force in our midst such as has been stationed here, taking the view that their presence is more needed in other places. And we further protest against the employment of specials and armed thugs, whose presence only serves to irritate the men on strike and increase friction and disorder."

The miners authorized a copy of the resolution to be sent to Premier Sir Richard McBride and petitioned the government to endeavor to bring about a conference between the two parties to the strike with a view of bringing about a satisfactory adjustment of the trouble.

PENSIONS WILL BE PROVIDED AFTER WAR

Parliament Will Consider the Question Immediately After Convening.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—That Parliament when it convenes on Aug. 12 will at once consider the question of providing for pensions for members of the Canadian expeditionary force who are in any degree incapacitated, was the announcement made this afternoon. Just what will be done is not known yet. Those dependent upon them may count on generous treatment it is certain. The pay of the privates in the ranks will be one dollar a day. The existing act provides that in the event of any soldier being killed his wife and family will be provided for. While it is not expected that the government will go in for insurance of the lives of those who serve, it is generally anticipated that the insurance companies will do as they did at the time of the South African war and enforce the clause in their policies declaring that those insured must not enter upon active military service. At the time of the South African trouble many wealthy Canadians came forward and offered to insure a certain number of soldiers. It is expected by the time the men leave, many similar offers will be received. It is stated that many British officers who have been unable to get passage home are applying for leave to join the Canadian forces. The

Some Citizens Are Buying Several Years' Supply.

May Mean Ready Money for Merchants, but is Quite Unnecessary.

"Let the war go on," said a big retail merchant this morning as he complacently folded his hands over his stomach and smiled out at the world. He was not beaming at his flood of customers from the front door; instead he stood at the back where his delivery wagons formed a constant stream to and from the door.

"I sold 5000 sacks of flour in the past few days," he declared. "As long as my customers want to fill their basements with flour and can pay anything that looks like real money, why, I'm satisfied. A little cash in hand looks good to me at this moment."

The same man said that the rush on sugar was almost as great and a whole lot of householders even went so far as to buy enough canned goods for a construction camp.

"They must intend to stack up the flour and canned stuff for a barricade expecting Vancouver to be bombarded," he suggested, laughingly. "I heard of one childless couple who bought no less than fifty sacks of flour. Why, they'll have to keep a fire in the basement from now on for the next few years to keep it dry."

The rush to the grocery stores created by the stories that foodstuffs would jump to impossible prices has been fine for the merchants concerned but, not so good for householders who have been forced to part with nice sums of money to lay in stocks which will last them through to next summer.

Most people believe that while prices may advance slightly in certain lines there will be no general rise or even a marked one in any particular line. For one thing, governmental action would be certain to follow if merchants in Canada attempted to take advantage of a war situation in Europe to boost their prices out of all reason. It is also pointed out that while there will no doubt be a heavy call on the producing centres of this continent, it will probably largely be confined to Britain and her allies, German trade routes by this time being practically obliterated.

"No matter what may come, it is practically certain that the government will attend to the little matter of feeding the people of Canada without citizens having to part with their bank rolls or the coins in their socks for a few meals," declared a resident today. "If they are a month ahead of the game, that is plenty. A sudden panicky feeling seems to induce them to buy for five years ahead, but that is quite unnecessary."
