iThird avenus west, in which Mutab Bingh and his companions were asleep at the time, was totally wrecked, while a dozen houses in the vicinity were badly shaken by the shock of the explosion and hardly a single pane of glass remains whole in the neighborhood.

Following the murder, several weeks ago, of Rattan Singh, a member of the Bela Singh faction in the Bikh community and the open statements that other murders would follow, the authorities are of the opinion that it is a continuation of the Komagata-Maru feud which has already resulted in the violent deaths of many persong connected directly, or indirectly with the Komagata Maru.


