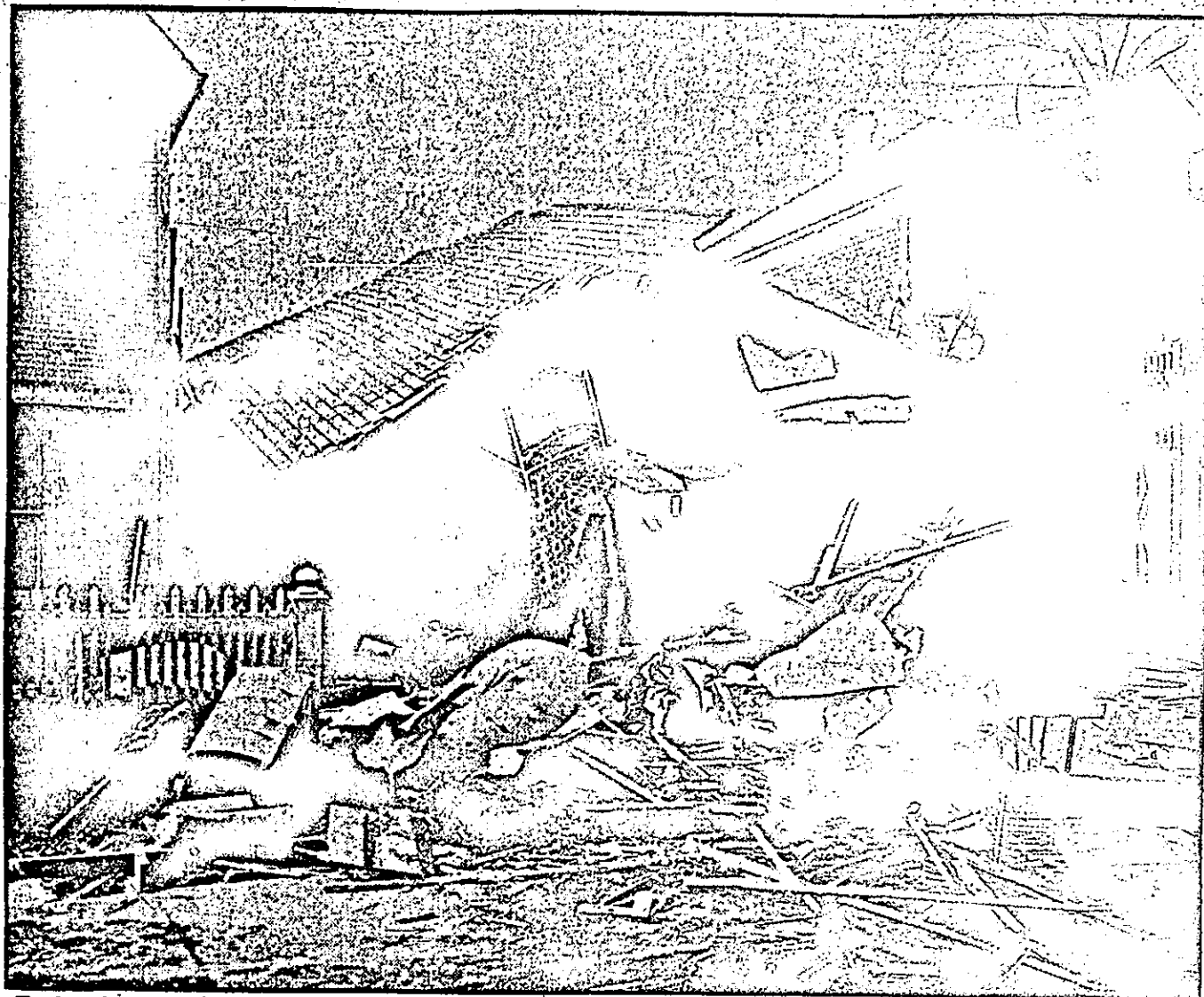

tic governments like those of France
and Great Britain could not carry on
a war if unsupported by public opin-
ion in their countries. In the circum-
stances it was thought to be of in-
terest to consult some representative

views taken in official circles.
All those questioned were men of the
world in the best sense of the word,
