QUARTER OF MILLION
CANADIAN SOLDIERS

Order - In - Council Authorizes
Enlistment of 100,000
More Men.

Ottawa, Oct. 29.—The decision to increase Canada's fighting forces to a quarter-million men was reached at a meeting of the cabinet late yesterday afternoon. So far as can be ascertained, no decision was reached as to the proportion of infantry, artillery and cavalry to be raised, but the probabilities are that there will be a preponderance of infantry regiments in the new forces. Although the order-in-council adopted yesterday authorizes the creation of an additional force of 100,000 men, it will only be necessary to enlist 77,000 men to bring the force up to a quarter of a million men. This is due to the fact that 172,000 men have already been enlisted. It is probable that the new rural enlistment plan recently announced by the minister of militia will be adhered to. The number of offers to raise county regiments already received indicates that the plan promises good results.

In connection with the announcement that the Canadian forces are to be increased, Sir Sam Hughes today said that he wants every officer and non-commissioned officer in Canada qualified for overseas service to report to the district officers commanding, so that they can be assigned to the new regiments to be raised. Qualified officers unable to go overseas owing to physical and other reasons are also asked to report in order that their services may be used for instructional purposes. The minister has received offers from Brant, Wellington, Waterloo, Perth and Huron Counties to raise either one or two regiments.

This morning, Sir Sam Hughes wired Col. Armagh offering him the command of a regiment to be raised in Montmagny County and district.

RETURNED TO DEATH

DETECTIVES TRYING TO
DISCOVER FIREBUGS

Bending Every Energy to Run
Down Arson Ring in
Seattle.

Seattle, Oct. 29.—Fearing that other waterfront fires may follow the blaze which late Thursday damaged pier 14 to the extent of more than \$1,000,000, detectives today are bending every effort to accomplish the arrest of those responsible for the conflagration. Officers are working on the theory that the fire at pier 14 was caused by members of an arson ring sworn to prevent shipments of munitions to foreign governments.

D. Wilmann, the Norwegian longshoreman, who was arrested before the fire had been extinguished, is still held at the city jail pending the outcome of the investigation. Wilmann protests his innocence, but employees at pier 14 have identified him as a man who was seen lurking in the vicinity of the dock several days before the fire occurred and whose actions aroused suspicion.

Workmen are engaged in clearing away the ruins caused by the fire. Great quantities of hemp, rice, tea and other supplies stored on the wharf were damaged so badly that they will be a total loss. The floor of the pier and the water surrounding it is covered with tea leaves from broken hampers.

TO STAND BETWEEN
CHINA AND DISASTER

Japanese Intervention Would
Seriously Hamper
Allies.

Washington, Oct. 29.—The intervention of Japan in case a revolt should result from the proposed re-establishment of a monarchical government in China would so hamper the Allies that a protest has been sent Yuan Shi Kai, President of China, according to information received here.

The Allies point out that a change of China's Government would, without doubt, result in internal troubles and that Japan would take a hand in the difficulties. This would necessitate the closing of Russia's munition sources, as Japan would then need all her factories.

HEIR TO MONEYBAGS
IS SEEKING A JOB

Son of Seattle Millionaire
Will Find Something
to Do.

Seattle, Oct. 30.—Penfield Peabody, son of Charles E. Peabody, Seattle millionaire, is looking for a job today so that he may earn a living for 18-year-old Mrs. Peabody, nee Martha Stewart, with whom he eloped a week ago. Peabody is sorry that his father is so wrought up over his elopement and subsequent marriage, but is surprisingly confident of his ability to earn a living independent of the paternal moneybags. Peabody is 17 and very optimistic.

HINDU WINS AGAINST
KOMAGATA COMMITTEE

Court Orders Judgment to Sundar Singh for Return of \$500 Loan.

An important judgment to the Hindu fraternity, arising out of the Komagata Maru incident, has been handed down by Judge Schultz. In which his honor has awarded judgment to Sundar Singh against the Komagata Maru committee for the return of \$500 he had loaned to the committee.

The money was part of a large fund raised by the Vancouver Hindus at the time the Komagata Maru was here, with the object of renewing the ship's charter, take over her cargo of coal and sell it in the city and to secure for her a cargo for the Orient. The merchandising of the cargo proved impossible and the vessel sailed away causing a total loss to the organizers of the expedition and the Komagata Maru committee in Vancouver, who however allege that they were given a promise of indemnity by the Federal Government.

The dispute in the lawsuit was as to whether the sum of money handed over by Sundar Singh to the committee was a loan or a contribution. The defence, led by Mr. J. Edward Bird, argued that the money was a contribution but the plaintiff, who was represented by Mr. C. M. Woodworth, contended that it was a loan. There are a hundred or more Hindus with claims aggregating about \$40,000 in the same class as Sundar Singh, who have been watching the progress of Sundar Singh's case with keen interest. It is regarded as certain that the decision will be appealed.

ONLY IN B. C. COURTS
Important Decision on Dominion Trust Given at Regina.

Regina, Sask., Oct. 30.—All actions relating to the closing up of the affairs of the defunct Dominion Trust Company must be brought in the British Columbia courts, according to a decision of their lordships sitting in Supreme Court this morning. The decision was rendered in the test case of Mowat vs. Dominion Trust, and was an appeal from the decision of Justice Brown.

The estate of the late Alexander Mowat, totalling about \$150,000, was administered by the Dominion Trust Company, and G. H. Barr, acting for the widow, asked the Saskatchewan court for an order for an accounting by the administrator of the trust company. He argued that to require an action to be taken in the British Columbia court would necessitate great expense to his client and that to require Saskatchewan people to go to British Columbia for justice in the matter of the defunct company would be both an injustice and a great, unnecessary expense. He admitted, however, the necessity for obtaining the consent of the court of British Columbia. Their lordships decided that this must be brought up in the British Columbia court.

TEUTON SHIPS DESTROYED
Twenty With Total Tonnage of 35,000 Sent to Bottom.

London, Oct. 30.—The Liverpool Post publishes a list of twenty German ships, aggregating more than 38,000 tonnage, sunk by British submarines in the Baltic Sea between Oct. 11 and 23, as follows:
